## WHO WE ARE

Malaria No More is working to create a world where no child dies from a mosquito bite. We use our strategic advocacy and innovative partnerships to engage global leaders, rally the public, and deliver lifesaving tools and education to families across Africa. Our goal is to create the political will and mobilize the global resources required to achieve malaria eradication within our generation.

Malaria No More is a global organization with offices in Seattle, DC, New York, Kenya, Nigeria and Cameroon, and affiliates in Japan and the United

Kingdom. Malaria No More has the worldwide reach necessary to take on the world's oldest and deadliest disease.

## WHAT WE DO

Malaria threatens the lives of 3.2 billion people across the globe—almost half of the world's population. It kills 438,000 people every year—most of them African children under the age of 5. In fact, a child dies about every two minutes from malaria.

The tools needed to prevent and treat malaria exist. But to achieve elimination, we need innovative technologies and comprehensive, sustained strategies—and these cost money. We work to increase government, consumer and corporate funding so we can fight this disease and eliminate it once and for all.

Malaria No More works closely with the U.S and U.K. governments to generate political will and resources for the malaria fight. Over the past decade, increased funding from these key donor countries has helped fuel the historic declines in malaria cases and deaths. We also work with the leaders of malaria-endemic countries in Africa, Asia and Latin America to increase the amount of attention and funding they commit to malaria each year.

## WHEN WE BEGAN

In 2005, President George W. Bush launched the President's Malaria Initiative (PMI), a government program designed to cut malaria deaths in half in sub-Saharan Africa and Southeast Asia. Malaria No More was founded in 2006, the same year that the first-ever White House Summit on Malaria was held. The next year, the UN appointed Ray Chambers as

Special Envoy for the Financing of the Health MDGs and for Malaria. In 2008, the MDG Summit brought \$3.2 billion in new money to the malaria fight, and leaders at the G8 Summit pledged to distribute 100 million nets. Worldwide commitment to ending malaria has never been greater than it is today.

## HOW WE WORK

We engage leaders at all levels of government to raise awareness of malaria, generate political will and mobilize the resources needed to defeat this disease. Our relationships with high-level officials in both the United States and United Kingdom have enabled us to help deliver \$2 billion in annual funding for malaria.
